MY ECO CONVERSION: A LITANY OF LOVE AFFAIRS

For many years, up into my mid-sixties, the question that kept coming to my mind was, "What am I supposed to be when I grow up?" Next, I found myself not wanting to read spiritual books, or even The Bible. I continued reading and reflecting on the Gospels. I felt a need to learn how to think for myself, and reading the thoughts of others was not helpful.

A friend told me about contemplative and centering prayer, which I began practicing. Shortly after, I picked up *Psalms for Praying: An Invitation to Wholeness* by Nan Merrill. The word "wholeness" stood out. Yes, I yearned to be not only *whole* but *holy* as well! The translation of the Psalms, the inclusive language, Creation described with such earthiness, was speaking to my heart, and God became... *my beloved*.

I was enamored with these words in our Consensus Statement: "we move always toward profound love of God and love of neighbor without distinction." My desire to serve "my dear neighbor," which includes everything in this cosmos, became my ministry, opening my heart to the importance of each moment. To see with the eyes of the heart, to hear with the ears of the Divine grows more intimate through each moment. Reading the Gospel with the new understanding that I can read between the lines, brings Jesus and his ministry more alive and personal. Could this be another "love affair?" I hope so!

Then the love affairs grew real, happening so often it sometimes took my breath

away, brought tears of joy, sadness, fullness or filled my body with fire.

I was waiting in line at the grocery store and noticed a box of truffles in the person's basket behind me. I looked at him, pointed to the box and asked, "Ohhhh, you like those truffles?" "You bet I do!" "So do I!" and he gave me a big smile. We introduced ourselves and mentioned how happy we were to meet each other.

Since that moment, I have become a very extroverted introvert. I especially express my gratitude to those who clean the floors or do the re-shelving, telling them that without their presence we would have a big mess and that their work is most important. I introduce myself and ask their name. Yes, how very important is their name.

I chatter with the squirrels, talk to the trees and flowers—even to the roses whose petals are browning, thanking them for gifting this creation with their beauty. ... to the Garden Snail, carrying its brown and gold spiral shell, tentacles stretched forward, the soft body leaving behind a trail. ... to the mockingbirds, unable to protect their nests from invading crows, who eat the eggs, or fly off with babies to feed their own hatchlings. My heart cries for the mockingbirds. This is survival, but still it hurts.

...hums of the honeybees, gathering pollen and nectar from the red blossoms of a flaming eucalyptus tree.

Discovering the intelligence of trees through threadlike fibers called mycelium (singular), mycelia (plural), that grow underground between the trees' roots allowing them to communicate with each other.

I watched a man, as he brushed the sidewalk clean with the waving of a

blanket. He spread it out, sat down and took off his shoes, placing them at the top end. He stretched out on the blanket, his head pillowed on the shoes, ready for sleep. I carry his image in my heart...

COMMUNAL PRAYER SERVICE

Psalm 43:1-5

Grant me justice, O God; defend me from a faithless people; from the deceitful and unjust rescue me.

You, O God, are my strength. Why then do You spurn me? Why must I go about mourning, with the enemy oppressing me?

Send Your light and Your fidelity, that they may be my guide; Let them bring me to Your holy mountain, to the place of Your dwelling,

That I may come to the altar of God, to God, my joy, my delight. Then I will praise You with the harp, O God, my God.

Why are you downcast, my soul? Why do you groan within me? Wait for God, for I shall again praise him, my savior and my God.

Now this is the message that we have heard from Him and proclaim to you: God is light, and in Him there is no darkness at all. If we say, "We have fellowship with Him," while we continue to walk in darkness, we lie and do not act in truth. But if we walk in the light as He is in the light, then we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of his Son Jesus cleanses us from all sin.

Reading from Laudato Si'

There is a nobility in the duty to care for creation through little daily actions, and it is wonderful how education can bring about real changes in lifestyle. Education in environmental responsibility can encourage ways of acting which directly and significantly affect the world around us, such as avoiding the use of plastic and paper, reducing water consumption, separating refuse, cooking only what can reasonably be consumed, showing care for other living beings, using public transport or car-pooling, planting trees, turning off unnecessary lights, or any number of other practices. All of these reflect a generous and worthy creativity which brings out the best in human beings.

Reflection

Conversion is not real nor true if it does not have a direct impact on the care for our world. This impact is based on small actions that, multiplied by the constancy and conviction of many people, are capable of generating great changes. And these small actions, such as turning off an unnecessary light, are not very difficult to carry out. It is enough to start with one of them: then, the force of habit will make us acquire the practice and these actions will be carried out naturally and will increase in number, intensity and effectiveness.

Petition

God of goodness, as the day is setting, send your light so that transformed by it we may serve our brothers and sisters and the earth that welcomes us, offering ourselves to their full service through small daily actions capable of having an effective impact on them. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

ECOLOGICAL CONVERSION

Three years ago, I began to seriously explore what Pope Francis was talking about in *Laudato Si'* regarding ecological conversion.

Initially, I began making changes such as replacing many personal care and household cleaning items with those that did not have plastic and were healthier for the environment. These practices multiplied as time went on and my budget would allow. That led to thinking more about the clothes I wear and the food I eat, which are more difficult changes for me to make. All of these things I am swapping out means that almost hourly, I am reminded of my commitment to Earth's sustainability as I touch my cotton handkerchief, use my sustainable lip balm, or choose my food. I have been able to maintain these choices because I recognize how others are harmed by my unsustainable actions.

I attended useful webinars that helped me see more clearly the intersectionality of climate change with poverty, forced migration and racism. Climate change, biodiversity extinction, and plastic pollution are leading us to a mass extinction that may make this planet uninhabitable for humankind for the foreseeable future. It wasn't that I didn't know these things before, it's just that now this ecological conversion process seemed to increase the urgency and priority it takes in my life.

Each action I take, whether it is a personal choice or an action for justice, reinforces

my overall commitment and conversion. My little changes and choices are not enough to turn around the current trajectory towards planetary destruction. However, they have moved me to prioritize acting for change. I recognize that time is short and the change must occur at the international, national and local government levels as well as at the personal level. We need to engage multinational companies. Unless we limit global warming, end plastic pollution especially in our oceans and waterways and stop species extinction by the midcentury or earlier, life on this planet will be very different. Those who will suffer the most will be the poor, but none of us will be exempt.

When I bought my first shampoo and conditioner bars (like a soap bar with no plastic in the product or its packaging), I did not know that it would lead me to make so many different choices for our environment. I know that these environmental issues are complex, and I don't have the background to become an expert or learn enough about all the science that addresses them. However, I know there are good partners who do know the science, know the actions we need to take, and the urgency of doing it now. My ongoing ecological conversion helps me to make personal changes in my behavior. However, I now see that my primary task is to amplify the voices of these experts so that more of us together can achieve the needed systemic reforms to save our planet.
